By the way, if it seems to you that a lot of the right answers above are D's or J's, then congratulations: you have noticed a real pattern in the ACT that is deliberately mimicked in this practice set. In the Second Edition of the Real ACT Prep Guide, D or J occurs 50% of the time with Style questions, an outcome that is 99.99% likely not to have occurred by chance. That is, a preference for making the last choice right seems to be built into these questions, especially ones testing Concision. Bottom line: if you encounter what you recognize as a Concision question and you're not sure of the answer, guess D or J.
